Traditionally used antidepressants may not be meeting the needs of MDD patients

Challenges patients living with MDD may face with treatment:



Delayed efficacy

Traditional antidepressants can require ~1 month or more for noticeable antidepressant effect.1



Cycling through same treatment class

In a retrospective claims

data analysis (n=48,440),
among MDD
patients treated
with 3 or more
lines of therapy,
the most common
treatment
sequence was:
1) SSRI, 2) SSRI,
3) SSRI.²



Bothersome side effects

In a study of 401 MDD patients on SSRIs, 55% reported experiencing bothersome side effects.³

In the 2022 SUPPORT survey of patients with MDD (N=385), 74% of patients were not satisfied with the efficacy of their current treatment.^{4*}
